## Mike Pavey wins 2008 Masonic "Excellence in Education" Award

The Masonic Excellence in Education award is an award presented by Masonic Lodges state wide to express Masonry's appreciation for the great teachers throughout the state. Recipients of this honor are then eligible to be selected for the Iowa Masonic Teacher of the Year Award.

The Masonic Excellence in Education Award is given to an outstanding teacher who exhibits these standards: Conduct; courtesy; responsibility; honesty; cheerfulness; kindness; consideration of others and community involvement.

The recipient of this year's award has exemplified all the above standards throughout his 36-year career at Columbus Community Schools. He has not only served as a teacher, but also as a coach, advisor, mentor and friend, not only to the kids he has taught but also to the community of Columbus Junction.

Written in a speech that was given by one of his past students, Matt Storm stated, "His leadership has been an integral part of shaping the character of many that have graduated from Columbus Community Schools. He has not only taught students to excel in the classroom, but also to become better human beings." Matt went onto write, "The award winner this year is also known for his upbeat attitude and cheerful demeanor. His kindness to the community has been shown in many ways. He has been an active member of the Lions Club, organizer of blood drives, a Trustee of the United Methodist Church, and served on countless committees for the betterment of our community."

As he presented the Award, Matt went onto say, "On behalf of the members of the Columbus City Masonic Lodge #107, I would like to present Mr. Mike Pavey with the 2008 Masonic Excellence in Education Award."

Mike Pavey is another example of why our community is so lucky to have so many dedicated individuals. His years of service to the young of our community and to organizations he has been involved in shows why he was chosen and deserves the award: Middle School student council advisor for 28 years; Columbus United Fund Board member; Louisa County Chapter of the American Heart Association charter board member; chairman of the Columbus Junction blood drives for 21 years; 12 gallon blood donor; Trustee of the Columbus Junction United Method-

ist Church; Columbus Junction Public Library Board member; member of the Columbus Steering Committee for the new Civic Center; night levee patrol during the 1993 flood; Fellowship of Christian Athletes advisor; Louisa County Sesquicentennial Commission secretary; Columbus Community Fitness Center shingling supervisor and volunteer worker; Columbus City Cemetery board member; Voltaire repairer of broken headstones.

For the application he was also to list honors he had received, professional, civic or outstanding. His list just shows that professionalism and dedication has gone beyond and above for Columbus Community Schools and his community. He has received the following: Iowa Council for Social Studies Middle School Teacher of the Year; Southeast Iowa Regional Planning Commission Volunteer of the Year; Iowa Lions Warren-Coleman Award recipient; Lions Club Outstanding Service Award; Outstanding Blood Drive Coordinator Award recipient; Columbus Junction Community Club Volunteer of the month; and Columbus Schools nominee for the University of Iowa Distinguished Teacher Award, to name just a few.

Mr. Pavey was also profiled in the following publications: Outstanding Young Men of America; Who's Who Among America's Teachers; Who's Who in American Education and the Burlington Hawkeye newspaper Teacher of the Year nominee.

As part of the application process the question was asked of the applicant, "Why should you be selected as the Iowa Masonic Teacher of the Year?"

This was so well answered by Mr. Pavey, and I quote, "I would be a worthy Iowa Masonic Teacher of the Year because my career mirrors many of the ideals and activities of Iowa's Masons. As I read the online edition of the March, 2008 issue of the Grand Lodge Bulletin, I was fascinated by the similarities between the educational and service projects of the Iowa Masons and my own professional and service activities. I often attempt, on a personal level, to reach some of the same goals that the Masonic Order accomplishes on a more organized level. In essence, I am moving, though with less efficiency, in the same direction as the Masons. I was excited to read of Iowa Grand Master Donald E. Mossier's reminder that attitude is the key to success. I have often made the same statement to my students. Maintaining a positive atti-

tude is also one of the guiding forces in my own life. I read with keen interest the articles relating to the many and varied service projects undertaken by the Iowa Masonic Lodges. Award because of his excellence as an educator and his accomplishments as a volunteer. He is well respected and an honored classroom teacher. He has proven himself a chosen leader in his teaching profession as well as a community volunteer.
