Van Auken is not a stranger to the buses. She has driven one since 2001 to the present time. She started with a route to Conesville and then switched to one south of CJ that takes her on the Old White Way. She still drives this route.

Her new duties, as transportation director, require her to schedule buses for sports trips and other activities in addition to making sure the buses are out on their daily routes. If a regular driver is sick, she gets a sub. Keeping athletic and activity buses going at night and on weekends

is quite a job. Also school cars and vans must be scheduled for smaller trips.

Another duty for Van Auken is making sure all the vehicles and buses are running in "tip top" condition. Routine maintenance checks are made along with any repairs that need

The Columbus School currently has three students who need wheel chairs. Three different buses must get and return these students. Van Auken reports that the school is now going to buy a new bus that will hold three wheel chairs at the same time, thus making only one trip. There are many aspects to this job.

Van Auken comments, "I really like this job. It is challenging, but that's what I like—it keeps me on my toes."

In addition, Azure works as an associate in the Special Needs room at Roundy Elementary. Plus she has helped in general classroom educa-
