

# City of Letts merges past with future

Overcast skies and a light rain could not dampen the spirit of the citizens of Letts last Monday afternoon as Letts celebrated their past by moving into the future. That date marked the 100th anniversary of the Letts Library, but it also foreshadowed the future of Letts as ground was broken for the new Letts Community Center.

This new facility will house the city's Library, City Hall, community room, and through the gift of a \$25,000 generator from FEMA, will also serve as the city's emergency shelter.

Although preliminary estimates put the cost of the building at \$800,000, cost estimates are now projected at \$600,000. Funding for the facility came from a \$400,000 IJOBS Grant, a \$60,000 Carver Trust Grant, a \$25,000 Grant from Muscatine Foods, with the balance from private donations and fund raisers. "The citizens of Letts never cease to amaze me," said Mayor Jerry Kirk, "this project has been in the planning stage for four years, and people never gave up in their fundraising efforts. This will mark a new beginning for our community."

Dirt work is scheduled to begin next Monday, with an anticipated

completion date of October 1st. First Construction Group will be the general contractor with ten local contractors serving as sub-contractors.

When completed, this new facility will not only be a valuable asset to the citizens of Letts, but will also serve as a monument to a community

of citizens that care.

Congratulations to everyone in Letts for this amazing accomplishment.

## U of Iowa faculty to visit C.J.

The professors will become the students when a group of University of Iowa faculty members embarks on a two-day learning tour of Southeast Iowa this month. The fifth annual Faculty Engagement Corps will visit Fort Madison, Burlington and Columbus Junction, where UI faculty will meet with business, and civic leaders, visit schools, tour a hospital and discover the power of wind energy.

The trip allows faculty members to develop a clearer understanding of the cultural, historical, economic and educational underpinnings of the state, and introduces faculty to the communities from which their students come and in which the state taxpayers live.

"Often when our faculty and administrators visit Iowa communities, we are making presentations about an area of our expertise or sharing information about the university's mission, goals and achievements," said UI Provost Wallace Loh. "This trip is different. It's a learning mission for our faculty, an opportunity to find out how we can contribute to these communities' efforts and to learn from what they are already doing so well."

The group will start in Fort Madison on Wednesday, May 19, where it will tour Siemens Energy and meet with the executive team to learn about wind energy and the future of Iowa's green economy. From there the bus heads to Burlington, where the group will meet with leadership and staff at the Great River Medical Center day concludes with a dinner meeting with business and civic leaders who will share the successes and challenges of one of Iowa's oldest communities.

The tour's second day focuses on education, with May 20 visits to Southeastern Community College in the morning and Columbus Junction Community Schools in the afternoon.

The Engagement Corps began in 2006 as part of the university's Year of Public Engagement and now is supported by the Office of the Provost, the Faculty Senate and the Office of University Relations.

"I am so gratified at the gracious and generous way the hosting communities have opened their doors to us," said Loh. "I truly believe the university faculty are the net beneficiaries of this important exchange of ideas."

## County Interpretative Center receives \$10,000 from Tri-Rivers Foundation

Going once, going twice... \$10,000 for the Louisa Interpretive Center! The Board of Directors of Tri-Rivers Conservation Foundation recently approved directing \$10,000 from the proceeds of their February auction to the Louisa Interpretive Center at Langwood. The auction raised \$10,700; the balance not designated for the interpretive center project will remain in the foundation's general fund to support conservation activities in the Louisa Resource Area.

This year's auction, held at Delzell Bros. near Morning Sun, had record attendance and was a record setting fundraiser for Tri-Rivers. "People came to support the Interpretive Center and we are thrilled to be able to direct another \$10,000 to that project!" remarked Kathy Vance, Louisa Interpretive Center fundraising committee co-chair. This

is the fifth donation of this size for the Louisa County project. Previous major donations came from the Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation, the Tri-Rivers Board of Directors, Dorothy and AJ Boysen and Cloverdale Farm.

The Louisa Interpretive Center will be a natural resource focused Great River Road destination with indoor and outdoor exhibits plus 40 acres of natural surroundings adjacent to Langwood Education Center, southeast of Grandview. Fund raising is currently underway to provide matching funds for a \$576,000 Federal Scenic Byways grant awarded for site and design work that is starting this spring.
