What a long and fun-filled journey it has been for Sue, who had operated Plants and Things. Several years ago, a young girl from Belmond, IA with a fashion merchandising degree, met a first year teacher on a blind date. After their marriage, he suggested that they move to his hometown of Wapello for a couple of years. That changed everything. Thirty-five years and many adventures later, Sue fondly recalls how she came to Columbus Junction.

About thirty-three years ago, her sister-in-law, Kristie Cummings, told her that there was a plant shop for sale in Columbus Junction. For Sue, who absolutely loved plants, and in fact acquired 150 of them in her home, it was a dream come true. She purchased Mary's Tropical Fish Store, which was located north of the building that houses La Hacienda. Making the decision not to sell fish, but rather, focusing on plants, it didn't take her long to realize that she needed to find out more about flowers. Although this was her God-given talent, she had no formal training in it, as she was self-taught. She loved working with plants and flowers and could look at something and recreate it. Sue set out with enthusiasm and attended many floral shows. Inspired by the creations she saw, she scaled arrangements down, as most of them were cost prohibitive.

After about three or four years,

Sue moved to her present location, knowing that it was a more visible one for her business, as well as a larger space in which to work. As she provided more plants and flowers, people began asking for other gift items.

Over the years Sue has researched the trends of the time and added them to her store, with Willow Tree being the number one seller, with Isabel Bloom following. Candles, silk flowers, jewelry, and wines are also popular gifts. She has maintained both high quality and affordable prices in a small town setting, a balancing act that she believes to be vital.

Missing numerous family events and activities over the years, Sue has given 100% loyalty to her customers, not wanting to let anyone down. Much of her business revolves around weddings and funerals, so she knows all too well that "life happens" and customers might need her on a moment's notice, consequently she's always been ready to assist the people who have counted on her.

Sue noted that Valentine's Day has been her biggest holiday, followed by Mother's Day. Relaying that this is not a one-person job, Sue spoke fondly of many of the local employees who have worked at the store, over the years, complementing their talents. Proud of the fact that she's provided both FTD and Teleflora wire services, she has had the capability of wiring flower arrangements all over the world.

While devoting endless hours to her customers and store, Sue has actively participated in Community Club, organizing both Columbus Day and Family Night, no small tasks, modestly stating that she feels like

Sue takes great pride not only in the quality of her work, but also the time she spends informing customers how to care for their plants. Her greatest joy has been to put a smile on someone's face, cheering them up, as she delivered flowers to them. One vivid memory for Sue was making a flower arrangement shaped like a guitar for a funeral, at the family's request, as the deceased had played the guitar. Always ready for a challenge, she created a stealth bomber out of flowers, attributing her creativity to her father, whom she recalled had created things.

You may ask why Sue has made the decision to sell her extremely successful business after thirty-three years. Officially, as of June 1, Rachel Rees took over the helm, having purchased it. Both Rachel, and her mother, Diane Olson will operate the

store, maintaining the same quality and service that we've all become accustomed to. Sue knows she's leaving her "baby" in good hands and feels comfortable with the transition, as both Rachel and Diane have worked at the store for three years. Sue has also agreed to work with them any time she's needed over the next year.

So, what's the next adventure for Sue Johnson? Well, she's been assisting her husband at the Indian Hills Golf Club for the past four years, and the long hours, as well as seven day weeks, have resulted in two jobs for her. ## Governor Branstad issues Disaster Proclamation for Louisa County

(DES MOINES) – Governor Terry E. Branstad last week issued a proclamation of disaster emergency for additional counties in response to recent storms and flooding.

Eight counties are included in this proclamation: Benton, Grundy, Johnson, Louisa, Lyon, Mitchell, Poweshiek and Wapello.

The Governor's proclamation allows state resources to be uti-

lized to respond to and recover from the effects of these storms, including for removal of debris and wreckage on publicly or privately owned land that may threaten public health and safety.

This proclamation of disaster emergency also activates the Iowa Individual Assistance Program in the following five counties: Grundy, Johnson, Mitchell, Poweshiek and Wapello.

The Iowa Individual Assistance Program provides grants up to \$5,000 for households with incomes up to 200 percent of the federal poverty level, or a maximum

annual income of \$39,060, for a family of three.

Grants are available for home or car repairs, replacement of clothing or food, and for the expense of temporary housing. Original receipts are required for those seeking reimbursement for actual expenses related to storm recovery. The grant application and instructions are available at the "Disaster Assistance" link on the Iowa Department of Human Services website: [www.dhs.iowa.gov](http://www.dhs.iowa.gov). Applications must be received within 45 days of the date of proclamation, May 29, 2013.

The Governor issued proclamations of disaster emergency on May 28 for 13 counties: Buena Vista, Butler, Cherokee, Floyd, Ida, Iowa, Jasper, Mahaska, Marshall, Plymouth, Sioux, Tama and Wright. The Iowa Individual Assistance Program was also activated on May 28 for 11 of those counties: Buena Vista, Butler, Cherokee, Floyd, Iowa, Jasper, Marshall, Plymouth, Sioux, Tama and Wright.
