

# City discusses flooded basements

Complaints over flooded basements has prompted the Columbus Junction City Council to authorize an engineering study be completed on sanitary sewer lines in the south end of the community. The council agreed to hire French-Reneker Associates, Fairfield, during the council's regular meeting on July 8, after several homeowners said sewer backups had flooded their basements following a June 21 downpour.

Mayor Dan Wilson said around five inches of rain fell in less than one hour in the community that day and caused street flooding, as well as the basement problems. The street flooding was so severe, volunteer firefighters were forced to rescue stranded motorists from their vehicles. One woman and five children were in a vehicle that nearly slid into a four-foot hole near the intersection of Highway 92 and Western Access Road. "We had water where we've never had it before," Wilson said.

However, local residents Cindy and Keith Milder, 101 Fulton, said there was nothing new about the water that came into their basement that evening. The Milders had complained several months ago about water problems. After officials cleaned some of the sewer lines in their neighborhood, the problem had not re-occurred - until the latest deluge hit. "We got six inches of water," Cindy Milder said, explaining some of it came from the basement toilet bowl overflowing. "It didn't stop," she said.

Twyla and Dan Peters, 920 Main, who live several blocks north of the Milders, agreed and said some solution needed to be found. "I'm tired of pushing water out of the basement," Dan Peters said.

Council member Hal Prior, 125 Springer, who lives just south of the Milders said he also got water in his house. After the water went down, he inspected a nearby manhole and discovered a thick layer of grease near the top of the structure. French-Reneker engineer John Meyer, who attended the meeting, said that could

provide a clue for some of the basement flooding.

"When I hear that, it sounds like migrating root or grease balls," he said, suggesting other causes could be illegal roof and foundation drainage going into the sanitary system.

The city experienced similar flooding in the late 1990s, but the problem appeared to disappear after the city jetted the sewer lines. Officials said that might be the solution again, but without knowing more information, any remedial action might be wasted. "It's a bit like chasing the wind," Meyer said, adding he was perplexed over why some residents reported problems while nearby neighbors apparently did not have any problems.

The council agreed and decided more study could help pinpoint the problems. It agreed to hire the engineering firm to conduct a house-by-

house inspection for illegal discharges into sewer lines and take basement elevation readings. The study will not include any smoke tests, after Meyer said the ground was likely too wet to get any good results.

He also suggested Columbus Junction officials talk to Columbus City officials about illegal drainage into the system. The two communities share a water treatment system and Columbus Junction maintenance workers reported a lift station near Columbus City runs more often than expected, causing Meyer to suspect excess water might be entering from Columbus City.

Meyer said he would provide a budget to the city, but expected the study to cost around \$5000. He also said if illegal drainage into the system is ultimately determined to be the problem, the city might be forced to get tough with property owners. A

penalty or fine for illegal connections might be needed to help control the amount of water coming into the system from the non-public portion of the sewer system. Meyer said Fairfield had run into a similar issue and had helped solve it by enforcing a \$100 surcharge on the water bills of any property with an illegal sewer connection. "That's got people's attention," Meyer said.

In other action, Wilson announced that although the city has received one grant for a planned relocation of the city's water works, it's still waiting to hear about a larger one that would make the project feasible. The contract for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) award of around \$350,000 has been received, but nothing has been heard on a \$3.2 million Economic Development Agency (EDA) award.

# Imagine having your trademark throughout the world

When Pat Diveney of West Liberty told his wife, Josefina, that he was going to try his hand at a new hobby, making pool cues she thought like every other wife would, "Yeah it's another middle aged phase he's going through." Little did she know that 15 years later his name would become a trademark all over the United States and Overseas.

That was 1994, and Pat's hobby has turned into another full time job for him. "I played pool a lot in my lifetime. My first cue I paid \$18 for. I always had a love for the game and would keep my cue clean and in good shape being ready for tournaments and sometimes walked away with a little prize money. I then started making a little money cleaning cues and doing cue repair for friends and thought to myself, there might be some extra money to be made actually making cues," says Diveney.

Sixty-one year old Pat has been employed at All Steel in Muscatine for 11 years working full time on the third shift as a maintenance mechanic. When Diveney gets off work he comes home and goes to his one man production shop and works another 8 hours producing custom, one of a kind cues, not only with quality workmanship, but with a real pride in each and every cue. "No cue is alike. You can buy 10 or 12 of the same kind of cue at a department store, they are all turned out by big production, but mine has no duplication they all are one of a kind and stamped with my trademark," states Diveney.

One of the first cues he made are called Bar Hustlers, a butterfly spliced one piece cue design. Now Pat even has specialty designs. Two of his most prized cues are one he made for his son, Danny, for a gradu-

ation present, complete with Danny's picture on it and his graduation date. The second being for the family of Iowa National Guard Chief Warrant Officer Bruce Smith of West Liberty, who died in November 2003 after his CH-47 helicopter he was piloting was hit by a surface to air missile and crashed. "When I give mine as a gift and I see the smile on peoples' faces it makes me feel really good," smiles Pat.

Working the Iowa State Tournament in Waterloo at the Sullivan Convention Center made Pat enough money to purchase his first lathe. Then selling his Bass Boat allowed him to purchase more equipment. Today, Diveney's shop is full with six lathes, three of which are computerized and two mills which are both computerized. His shop is filled with woods like, padouk wood, ebony wood and snake wood from Africa, olive wood from Palestine and hard rock maple from Canada. His shop is also filled with cue orders.

When Josefina was laid off from Louis Rich as a Security Guard, she became a big part in the business. She sells production cues, cases and accessories during the tournaments while Pat is busy repairing cues. "She has been a big help to me, she has given up a lot for me to be able to make a name for myself," smiles Pat.

Accomplishments for Pat was having his name added in the "Blue Book of Pool Cues," and having five pro pool players play with his cues, not to mention having cue collectors admire and purchase his cues. Also, he takes pride in being known around the world for his hand made pool cues, from the US to as far away as Brazil and the Philippines.

Pat is a 1966 graduate of Columbus Community High School. He and Josefina have been married for twenty-four years and reside in West
