No one who has lived in the area over the years could not know the significance that Beryl and his wife, Sime, have had on our community. In some way their generosity has had an impact on every person. If you go to the doctor, the Roundys donated the real estate for the clinic. If you go to the pharmacy, again the ground for this facility was donated by the Roundys. If you attend the Columbus Junction United Methodist Church, the Roundys were large contributors to the new church building. If you visit the library or city hall, the Roundys were major donors to the Civic Center where these facilities are housed. If you attend a reception or party at the American Legion, the Roundys were major donors to the building. If you or a family member eat at the Senior Center, Beryl was a major help in restoring the center after the flood of 2008. Scores of Columbus students have been recipients of scholarships form the Roundys. And of course, when your children or grandchildren go to school each day, they are walking into a building that was built because of a generous donation from the Roundys. And these gifts not only affect our generation, but will have an impact on generations well into the future. In addition, a trust established in Sime's name now makes annual contributions to numerous community organizations and causes, and will for years to come. I'm sure I have left out other areas where the Roundys have helped, but this is only part of the story of their


Beryl was a humble man. Al-

interested in what others were doing, and was thrilled with their successes. I was fortunate to be Beryl's neighbor for thirty years, and whenever Beryl was on his morning walk and I was in the yard working, he would always stop and see what I was doing. The visit would never be more than a couple of minutes, but he always took the time to stop. I remember when my youngest son, Tony, was about six years old, he asked me if he could go to a pond that he saw in the timber. I told Tony that it belonged to Beryl, and let's just go ask him. I found Beryl in his back yard, and when I passed on Tony's request, Beryl bent down and said to Tony, "That's what I built it for, to be used. Go out there anytime you want to,

A friend of mine told me that when he was young his mother died. It was during the depression, and his Dad had a lot of struggles supporting their large family. He said that whenever any cookies in Beryl's cookie case would be broken or get slightly stale, Beryl would put them in a bag and place them under the counter. Then when this person's Dad would come in to buy groceries, Beryl would hand him the bag for the kids. This friend said that he probably would never have tasted a cookie when he was young if it hadn't been for Beryl.

Another person told me that his Dad said that during the depression, when Beryl and Sime were struggling to keep their grocery store open, no one was denied credit. Although Beryl and Sime sometimes undoubtedly went without eating, they made sure that others had enough to eat. And more than likely, many times the Roundys were probably not paid, but I would doubt they ever held a grudge

But what always impressed me the most about Beryl was his optimism. I never heard Beryl say much about the past, he was always interested in tomorrow. Every May, when Beryl would return from Arizona, he though he had every right to, I never would charge into the Gazette and saw Beryl exhibit an air of self-im- change his address back to Columportance or bragging. Beryl was at the store as soon as the water receded, and was insistent on going in. I remember looking back behind the Gazette and seeing Beryl, 97 years old, in rubber boots carrying things out of the store. He wasn't there asking for any type of Government handout, he just wanted the store back for the community. He kept saying, "This town needs a store, and I'm going to get it back for them." I was told that Beryl said to one individual, "I'm not only going to get the store back as soon as possible, but it will be an even better store, even if it costs a million dollars."
