## City Council optimistic on grant applications

The potential that Columbus Junction will receive two grant awards continues to be encouraging, city officials agreed during the August 26 city council meeting. The city applied for \$600,000 in funding to upgrade the Iowa River levee late last year; and then earlier this year submitted a \$3.2 million proposal to move the city's water treatment plant. Both applications were related to efforts to mitigate future damage from flooding similar to that which hit the city last year.

Mayor Dan Wilson said he was optimistic after an August 19 meeting that the city's application to the Iowa Department of Economic Development (IDED) for the levee upgrade would get a serious look. He said the meeting was called by the IDED to review the city's request to raise the height of the levee to 34.5 feet. During last year's flood, the Iowa River crested at about 32.5', breaking down flood protection efforts and inundating the lower east end of the community.

Wilson and other officials said the meeting brought together a variety of federal, state and local officials to discuss the proposal and gather information. "We talked our way through the need for the levee and what happened last year," Wilson said, adding a tour of the levee was conducted by the group.

Wilson said he was hopeful the opportunity to review the project would help convince the IDED to support the city's request. Council member Hal Prior said he was encouraged by the response from the officials. "I didn't hear anything negative out of the whole thing. I thought it was very positive," he said.

Council member Phil Kaalberg agreed, explaining the meeting pro-

vided an opportunity for all the officials to become familiar with the proposal. "When they see it come across their desk, they'll know what we're talking about," he said. Kaalberg said he left the meeting feeling the city had strengthened its case for the funds. "I felt really good that after the meeting there was nothing to stop us from going ahead," he said.

Wilson said around 15 officials from the Army Corps of Engineers, Federal Emergency Management Administration, U.S. Department of Homeland Security, University of Iowa and Louisa County participated in the meeting with several city officials.

Council member Mark Huston, who said he was optimistic the city would receive some assistance, said some of the officials had indicated a decision might be made within a couple of months. The city is also hopeful a request for federal assistance to move the city's water treatment plant is still alive.

According to earlier discussions, the city requested \$3.2 million from the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) in February, along with a \$356,000 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) application. Wilson said the CDBG funding had been awarded, but the city was still waiting to hear about the larger grant. Officials are viewing a site along Collins Road as a potential new location for the plant.

In other action, the council learned that an engineering study of the city's sewer system in the south part of town is progressing, but few results have been released. Prior said he and other local residents who had water backup in their homes earlier this year had not yet been contacted by the engineers.

Kaalberg said he knew the invest-

igators had been in town recently, but suspected they were checking out parts of the system before they met with the local residents.

The council also received its monthly economic development report from representatives of the community development center board. Brooke Wilson, an intern with the center; and Nitza Lopez-Castillo reported on a number of activities involving the center.

Wilson said Iowa Workforce Development had agreed to provide another year of funding support for the center, which means Lopez-Castillo will continue to have her salary as assistant director paid through the grant. The development center board also staffed booths at the Johnson County and Louisa County fairs, Wilson also told the council.

A meeting will be held on September 3 at 7 p.m. at Roundy Elemen-

tary to review plans for the community health center, which is scheduled to be constructed soon in Columbus City. In a related note, Wilson said over \$10,407 in flood disbursement certificates had been redeemed.

An effort to resubmit a Safe Streets to Schools grant will also be launched this fall, she told the council. The latest effort will renew a proposal to construct a new sidewalk between Columbus City and Columbus Junction.

In final action, Wilson presented a letter from Police Chief Marlin O'Donnell, announcing he planned to retire on December 31, 2009. City officials said O'Donnell had worked for the city since September 1992. Wilson said he would schedule meetings with council members and the council's public safety committee to discuss the pending vacancy.
