

City affiliates with Keep America Beautiful



At a meeting last Wednesday, Columbus Junction made the first steps to become a national affiliate with the Keep America Beautiful organization.

Representatives from Keep America and Keep Iowa Beautiful were on hand to hold the initial phase of the training program. Those attending the program were updated on the goals and mission statement of KAB, and encouraged to set local goals.

In the next step, the local chapter will need to set an organizational body, elicit members from the community, do a survey of focus areas in the community rating the areas as to whether they are litter free to highly littered, and hold local certification training workshops.

The local chapter agreed to have all of the preliminary steps in place by the end of February, 2010. The local chapter will work in unison with the City Council and the various committees that were established during the summer workshops. The Gazette will keep readers updated as the chapter moves closer to final national affiliation.

City discusses watershed development for Monkey Run

The proposed development of a watershed management plan on the south fork of Monkey Run could help reduce flooding in portions of Columbus Junction, city officials learned during the October 28 city council meeting. The plan could even boost efforts to cut down basement flooding that has plagued areas in the south end of the community.

During her regular monthly report, Columbus Community Development Center Executive Director Mallory Smith updated the council on the proposal. She explained representatives from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service, Geode Resource Conservation and Development, Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship and other officials met October 26 to begin discussing the idea.

Smith said a grant application could be submitted to fund the program, which would focus on developing and eventually implementing a variety of recommendations to reduce runoff throughout the watershed.

Council member Phil Kaalberg, who attended the October 26 meeting, told the council the state and federal officials at the meeting had indicated if studies showed waterway flooding was impacting residential

areas, funding might be also available to mitigate those effects. He suggested residents along Fulton Court, Springer Avenue and other areas who reported basement flooding this year might benefit from those studies.

According to Mayor Dan Wilson, the south fork of Monkey Run flows northeast from near the Cedarcrest Country Club and eventually empties into Smith Creek, a tributary of the Iowa River. Flooding along Monkey Run has been severe in the past and could also be a factor in recent basement flooding in the south end of the community. The city hired French-Reneker Associates, Fairfield, earlier this year to study the problem following the basement flooding complaints.

Smith said the local watershed group would continue to meet and might develop a grant application later this year.

In addition to the watershed program, Smith also reported on several other activities she and assistant director Nitza Lopez-Castillo had conducted over the past several weeks. These included completion of Hispanic Heritage Month, which ran from September 15-October 15. Smith said Lopez-Castillo had worked on this project and had done a "spectacular job."

"It was a nice experiment and something to grow from," Smith said.

Smith said Lopez-Castillo was also working now on expanding a Minority Enterprise Construction Council program into Wapello. She said the council would help develop training and educational programs to aid minority businesses with bidding and other activities.

Smith also announced the groundbreaking ceremonies for the Community Health Center of Southeast Iowa would be held November 12. Construction on the building, which will be located at the intersection of Spring Street and Louisa County Road X-37 in Columbus City is expected to take from six to 12 months to complete.

Smith and Wilson reported on an upcoming November 2 meeting with officials of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). According to Wilson, the USDA has a program that can provide infrastructure and utility upgrades in the downtown. Wilson said the program had been discussed earlier this year, but had not been pursued.

However, the idea recently resurfaced and Wilson said it could possibly include replacement of the downtown sidewalks. He said the program normally would not cover sidewalks, but if the sidewalks were removed as part of a general utility upgrade, new sidewalks could then be installed.

Several old vaults are located

under some parts of the downtown sidewalks and officials have been eager to fill those because of safety concerns. Wilson said he would keep the council updated.

The council also received an update on the recent development of a Keep Columbus Beautiful affiliate with the Keep America Beautiful (KAB) campaign. Cecile Carson, a representative of KAB who has been working with local residents, told the council the development of a local affiliate was a positive step towards developing a comprehensive beautification program in the community.

The local program started several months ago after officials began looking into possible entryway beautification efforts. Eventually Keep America Beautiful and Keep Iowa Beautiful representatives began meeting with local residents and developing both long range and short range beautification ideas.

Carson said she hoped to have a report that focuses on those ideas available soon and would return to the community to discuss its proposals.

In final action, the council approved the city's 2009 financial report. According to the report, the city ended the 2008-09 fiscal year with a balance of \$533,313. There was a total of \$1,504,228 in expenditures.
