

School Board rejects early retirement program By Jim Rudisill present its proposal for seeking a recial ed associate (\$10.21 per hour);

For the fourth consecutive year an early retirement program will not be offered for licensed employees of the Columbus School District. The board voted 4-1 against offering a program during the board's regular November 21 meeting. The last time an early retirement program was offered in the school district was during the 2008-09 school year.

Superintendent Bridenstine, who submitted his resignation to the board last month, recommended against offering any early retirement. "Offering an early retirement program should benefit the school district and if it doesn't, it shouldn't be offered," he told the

Bridenstine said the district is currently not in any financial hardship and the district is not in any danger of losing a significant number of good young teachers. Nine teachers would likely be eligible for an early retirement, but Bridenstine said he did not know how many of those would actually use the program. Board president Marsha Gerot said if all nine retired, it could impact the district. "Losing nine teachers would not be a benefit for the district," she said. Other board members agreed; and approved Dave Duncan's motion not to offer a program. Board member Sandy Martin, who had earlier offered a motion to offer a program that failed when it was not seconded, voted against Duncan's mo-

In other action, the board agreed to ask G. Tryon And Associates, Johnston, Iowa, to attend a special December 5 budget workshop to placement for Bridenstine.

The board also agreed to split up the duties Dan Vogeler had provided as the district's maintenance/transportation/activities director. Vogeler also submitted his resignation in October, but his final day will be in December. Under the new arrangement, elementary principal Shane Rosenberg will assume the elementary custodial director's duties, while secondary principal Jeff Maeder will take over the junior/senior high school custodial duties. Technology coordinator Todd heck will assume the maintenance and grounds director's responsibilities.

Each of the new assignments will include a \$4000 stipend. Meanwhile, Vogeler's other duties as activities and athletic director will be assumed by Nate Carlson. Carlson's salary will be increased by \$7,493. All of the additional duties extend only through the current school year. Bridenstine said he would offer a recommendation for Vogeler's transportation duties at the December 5 meeting.

In other personnel action, the board accepted the resignation of Maureen Bridenstine as the district's TAG and high school speech coach, effective at the end of the school year. The resignation of Katie Farrier as the assistant varsity softball coach was also accepted. Her resignation is for the upcoming season. Other new hires included: Alicia Bright, junior high wrestling cheerleader sponsor (\$353); Nicole Beckley, elementary art activity (\$707); Eric Field, speech coach (\$1414); Steve Riley, high school varsity cross-country coach (\$3959); Katie Coil, junior high spe-

Beth Allen, K-3 At-Risk After School Associate (\$15 per hour); and Amy Widmer and Jill Hernandez, who will share the duties of a Migrant After School tutor (\$30 per hour). The last three positions are being funded by a

Bridenstine also asked the board to give him some direction on the 2012-13 calendar. He said under current state law, the earlier regular starting date for school would be August 27. However, that date would not allow the district to end its first semester at Christmas, a three-year-old practice in the district. Bridenstine said the school could start earlier than August 27, but would need to hold a public hearing on any earlier date. An earlier date could also conflict with families planning to attend the Iowa

Bridenstine said a start date next year that would correspond to this year's date would be August 15. However, the state fair runs from August 9 to August 19, which would make August 20 the earliest possible start date that would not conflict with the fair. "I think you either need to stop the semester at Christmas or not start until August 27," Bridenstine said. Starting school on August 27 would mean classes going to the end of May and possibly extending into June if there are any snow make-up days. Bridenstine said that could also create an imbalance in the number of school days between the first and second semesters. Bridenstine said there already is some difference, with the first semester going for 86 days and the second running 94 days. He said the ideal split is 90 days each.

Gerot said students she had talked with supported ending the first semester at Christmas. She said the students complained about coming back to school for semester tests after being away from the classroom for nearly two weeks. Duncan had a different take on the Christmas break, suggesting that when he was in school he may not have been able to finish a class assignment if classes had ended before Christmas. Despite that, he still supported seeing all the possibilities. "I think we need to explore all (options), but I do want to see an option for starting August 27 with two equal semesters," he said.

The board directed Bridenstine to develop three calendar proposals, using August 27, August 20 and August 15 as optional starting days.

In final action, Bridenstine presented the annual swimming pool report and received permission from the board to investigate submitting a Community Attraction and Tourism (CAT) grant to upgrade the pool. Bridenstine said the pool report showed the facility's ending balance on September 30, 2011 was \$32,704. He credited the district's voter-approved Public Education and Recreation Levy (PERL) for most of the surplus. "The PERL has greatly supported the swimming pool," he said, adding however, the facility was still facing major renovation needs. He said it needs a new bathhouse, decking repairs and other work, which the CAT grant could help meet. He said a grant award of \$100,000, coupled with additional funding from the school district and the City of Columbus Junction could meet the needs for
