

## Honoring those who made the ultimate sacrifice

"I have always been interested in reading the names that the Gazette publishes each Veterans' and Memorial Day of those individuals who lost their lives in the various wars," said local businessman Bob Reid, "and I thought that it would be great if we had a brick at the All-Veterans Memorial in Grandview for each of these veterans." Thus began an undertaking of the Reid Family that kicked off this year.

Bob, Sue and Rob Reid are the owners and operators of Reid's Mechanical Inc., and through their generosity the Louisa County Viet Nam Veterans recently received a check from the Reids for \$500 to purchase ten bricks at the Memorial.

"This is a great gift," said Memorial Committee member, Duane Lukavsky, "and it is our hope that other individuals will come forward to help so that in the near future we can have a brick immortalizing every Louisa County Veteran who made the ultimate sacrifice."

This is an opportunity for everyone to help, regardless of the amount that they can give. Each brick costs \$50, and all proceeds are used to maintain the Memorial and surrounding grounds. "If someone isn't able to give enough to purchase a brick, any amount will certainly help," said Lukavsky. All funds are held by the Committee until enough is collected to purchase bricks.

## Meet the Site Coordinator at Community Health Center

April, 2008 – Brenda Keller is hired as the Registered Nurse and Site Coordinator for Southeast Iowa's newest Community Health Center, the Louisa County Center in Columbus Junction. Up to this point she has worked in Long Term Care at Sunrise Terrace in Winfield for most of her career.

Early May, 2008 – Keller is working full time in the Burlington Clinic to train and realizing that Clinic Care is different than long term care in many ways. She is barely keeping her head above water as she crams in learning about charts and immunizations and vaccines, all those small tests – like pregnancy and strep, what it will take to handle scheduling and what it will take to have an oral operator (dentist office).

Mid May, 2008 – Working long days setting up the new office in Columbus Junction.

May 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2008 – The doors open to patients at the new clinic! But that is just the beginning for Keller, now there is the marketing to think of, the meetings to attend – like Community Club and Louisa InterAgency and there is an Advisory Board to host.

Monday, June 9<sup>th</sup> – Donny Orr comes to the office to tell Brenda and the staff that there is a real threat of flooding and they need to think about evacuating.

Tuesday, June 10<sup>th</sup> – The "Wall of Sand" is being constructed around them, but the clinic stays open and saw patients. That night the staff packed up and boxed everything they could.

Wednesday, June 11<sup>th</sup> – Staff moved papers and furniture to storage in Columbus City...and began to help in the community as needed.

Saturday, June 14<sup>th</sup> – Well...that's when the clinic was really in deep water.

Early July – Brenda works with Executive Director Ron Kemp to plan for a mobile clinic as soon as possible.

Friday, July 11<sup>th</sup> – The clinic begins seeing patients in a mobile unit parked in the Roundy Elementary Parking Lot, where they stayed for almost a month.

2<sup>nd</sup> Week of August – Mobiles are moved to the building site on Colonels Drive...and it's back to that drowning feeling again for the staff as they work through hooking up plumbing, power, phones and IT.

Mid October – One more time (and actually there will be one MORE time) moving into a new temporary building, setting up



plumbing, phones, IT and power again. Moving furniture again, setting up files again and all the while trying to see patients and help them feel comfortable and cared for.

November, 2008 – February, 2009 – A time of organization and getting the word out. More patients for a while, then a slow down over the holidays, then back to busy, but they're not in over their heads. Healthcare they can do, healthcare is their mission – bring it on they say!

What a wild ride Brenda Keller, RN has had in the last 8 months! Has it all been worth it? "Yes," says Keller. Why? "Because I like helping people, I like seeing the kids and making them feel better, I like to make a difference in people's lives."

All that and Keller is on home turf, as she grew up in Conesville, graduated from Columbus High (as a Wehmeyer) and has a child that graduated last year and another at CHS now (and a 3<sup>rd</sup> child in a younger grade in Winfield.) Keller says she feels a part of this community, she does business here, knows people here and feels that she belongs here (though she lives in the country outside town).

And of course, things are finally starting to fall into place. The real water went down a little faster than the figurative water that has been lapping at Keller since she began, but she is starting to swim and can see a time when she'll have her head above water and her feet on the shore. She even says she feels the sand in her toes at times already!

## Senior Center Update



New doors were recently installed on the Senior Center

We continue to make excellent progress towards a planned summer reopening of the Columbus Senior Center with several significant results to report since the last update. The really good news this week was that the long awaited new front door has finally arrived, and was installed this week. It looks great and has significantly brightened the interior appearance. Also since the last report the Senior Center was the recipient of a grant from the Community Foundation of Louisa County to assist in the rebuild of the flooring. This is a greatly appreciated award from the CFLC, which will be used soon for our new floor covering!

Installation of the new furnace/ac heat pump system is now complete as all components are now installed

and functional with only final close-out tasks remaining. All of the exterior wall insulation is now in place and nearly all of the exterior walls are now completely covered with 5/8 inch sheetrock. All of the ceiling is now also insulated and covered, with the exception of a portion of the kitchen. This has greatly increased the efficiency of maintaining heat in the building, as it is not being lost through the roof. We now have the new energy efficient ceiling lights, which will be installed after the ceiling is finished, and painted.

Watch for the next update in a couple weeks on your Senior Center's progress towards return as a viable part of the Columbus community. As always the community's continued great support is sincerely appreciated.

## County Audit Report released

Eide Bailly LLP reported that the County had local tax revenue of \$15,248,647 for the year ended June 30, 2008, which included \$622,073 in tax credits from the state. The County forwarded \$11,001,187 of the local tax revenue to the townships, school districts, cities, and other taxing bodies in the County.

The County retained \$4,247,460 of the local tax revenue to finance County operations. Other revenues included fees, fines and charges for service of \$735,485, operating grants and contributions of \$3,215,328,

capital grants and contributions of \$137,653, unrestricted investment earnings of \$165,768, local option sales tax of \$490,389, and other general revenues of \$130,535.

Expenses for County operations totaled \$9,216,063, a 6.4 percent increase from the prior year.
